## AREVILLE WATERWORKS INQUIRY.

### Engineer Re-instated.

As a result of the sworn inquiry held on the 14th  
 inst. in the Town Hall, by an Inspector from the  
 Dublin City Council, into the circumstances under which Mr P  
 Walsh was dismissed from the Engineership of  
 the Aroville Waterworks, has been received by the  
 Dublin City Council. The Local Government Department  
 states Mr Walsh in his position, and in a  
 lengthy communication conveying that decision  
 stipulates at length the evidence given at the  
 inquiry. Towards the close of the communication  
 the latter points out that with the exception of  
 Mr Walsh and Mr Moore the remainder of the staff worked  
 in complete harmony with Mr Walsh, and in other  
 respects he was admitted to be efficient and capable  
 of obeying orders.

The communication from the Local Government  
 Department concludes with the following state-  
 ment:—Having fully reviewed the evidence the  
 Minister is satisfied that Walsh's failure with  
 respect to Mr Moore was principally due to want of  
 support by the Committee and the Borough Sur-  
 veyor, and that his dismissal was not justified by  
 the facts of the case, and involved an injustice to  
 Mr Walsh. The Minister has, accordingly, decided that  
 Mr Walsh be re-instated in his position.

## WORKERS AND SHANNON SCHEME.

At a public meeting in the Town Hall Nenagh,  
 Thursday night, under the auspices of the  
 Limerick Transport and General Workers' Union, Mr  
 J. J. O'Connell, Dublin, organiser, who was the principal  
 speaker, strongly advised unity amongst the  
 workers, and, referring to the Shannon scheme,  
 that, if the workers did not want to give  
 their labour for insufficient remuneration for the  
 next four or five years, they should be thoroughly  
 organised in every little town or village on the  
 Shannon banks. This organisation should be

 started.

### Co. Limerick Girl's Tragic Death.

Southport, Thursday.—At an inquest at South-  
 port to-day on a sixteen-year-old schoolgirl named  
 Eima Marvella Van Bevar, of Bruff, Co. Limerick,  
 it was stated she was at the baths qualifying for a  
 bronze medal of the Royal Life-Saving Society,  
 when she was taken ill in the water and died  
 before the arrival of medical aid.

A post-mortem examination revealed that the  
 girl had a tumour on the wall of the heart, and  
 this caused death, with immersion in the water  
 as accessory.

A verdict of death from misadventure was  
 returned.
