the action of the magnates who control
the exchanges wheat rose and fell in price
early this year to such an extent that the
price of flour had to be regulated accordingly and with such variation and frequency
as to be wilder. But the people of these
countries should be made independent of
such methods, and it is satisfactory to find
that a league has just been formed in
London which will have the effect of
counteracting the designs of food gamblers
abroad.

THE CO. LIMERICK MOTOR FATALITY.

Inquest Adjourned.

The City Coroner, Mr J. S. McNelce, and a jury opened an inquest at Barrington's Hospital on Tuesday evening at six o'clock on the body of Patrick Bourke, Tipperary, who succumbed in the institution on Tuesday to injuries received in a motor accident at Dromkeen on the night of the 12 h instant.

Superintendent O'Rielly conducted the investigation, and evidence of identification was given by Peter Bourke, Marifield, Clonmel, father, who stated deceased was an ex-British soldier, aged thirty eight years, and unmarried. For some time past he lived in Tipperary.

Applying for an adjournment, Superintendent O'Rielly said he was not in a position to ca'l further evidence at that stage, as the other men who were with deceased were still in hospital suffiring from injuries. It would be a mouth probably before they could come forward to give evidence.

The enquiry was adjourned unt l the 15 h ploximo.
