## THE CO. LIMERICK MOTOR FATALITY.

### Inquest Adjourned.

The City Coroner, Mr J. S. McNeice, and a jury opened an inquest at Barrington's Hospital on Tuesday evening at six o'clock on the body of Patrick Bourke, Tipperary, who succumbed in the institution on Tuesday to injuries received in a motor accident at Dromkeen on the night of the 12th instant.

Superintendent O'Rielly conducted the investigation, and evidence of identification was given by Peter Bourke, Marlfield, Clonmel, father, who stated deceased was an ex-British soldier, aged thirty-eight years, and unmarried. For some time past he lived in Tipperary.

Applying for an adjournment, Superintendent O'Rielly said he was not in a position to call further evidence at that stage, as the other men who were with deceased were still in hospital suffering from injuries. It would be a month probably before they could come forward to give evidence.

The enquiry was adjourned until the 15th proximo.

### DEATH OF MR MARTIN CUSACK.

A large circle of friends have learned with sincere regret of the death of Mr Martin Cusack, at his residence, Church street, in his thirty-fifth year. The deceased had been in Kilkee on his usual summer holiday's when he was taken ill, but was able to make the journey home. That was a fortnight ago, and his condition growing worse, he gradually sank and passed away on Tuesday night. Mr Cusack was a great favourite in the city, and was held in the highest esteem by the firm of Messrs Woodford Bourne and Co., O'Connell street, where he was charge hand for
