The Brownes continued to visit Mrs Those visis were resented by the Keaner, and the ill-celling engendered caused a series of rows which oulminated recently in assaulte.

Thomas Browne, in support of a summons, told the Cours how he went to the window of the auut's room, and knowked to attrict her attention. While he was so engaged Martin Keane ran round from the back acd attacked him, knocking him He would down and breaking his false teeth. have got away had it not been for Mrs Keane, who held him by the right arm while her husband contloued to strike him about the face. A young man finally arrived and released him. He picked up his teeth and his hat and left.

Susan Browne said that on being ordered out of the house by Mrs Keane she returned and went to the window. She was talking to Mrs Collins on the avenue when Martin Keane arrived, and, se zing her roughly by the arm, forced her 100 yards though a fill and over a fence, and then warned her not to call agair,

The Keanes had oros summonses against the Bownes. This were dismissed, and the Justice held that the Brownes should be allowed access to the aunt. Martin Keane would be fined 40s and 4s for two assaults on Tom and Susan Browns. Nora Keans would be fined 5; and 6; for her part in two of the attacks. The Keanes were ordered to pay coats totalling £3.
