## PRICE OF GAS REDUCED.

The City Gas Committee at its meeting yesterday decided to make an immediate reduction in the price of coke, and gas for power purposes only. The Committee considered the present figure is rather high, and has taken this step in order to encourage the use of gas for industrial power. While every credit must be given to the C mmittee for its enterprise and foresight, it is the general opinion that some small reduction might also be made in the charge for lighting which is still high.

## IRISH TOBACCO EXPORTED.

### First Consignment in 100 Years.

Fifteen tons of tobacco leaf grown by the Irish Tobacco Growers' Association in the County Meath were shipped from Dublin on Monday by a British and Irish Company's steamer for sale in London.

This is the first shipment of Irish tobacco leaf for more than 100 years. In the early years of the nineteenth century the bulk of the leaf used in British factories was grown in Ireland. During the war with America in 1812-13 there was practically no tobacco used in England except what grew in Ireland. After the peace of 1815 the industry was suppressed in Ireland by the Government, and the growers emigrated to the United States.

At present the Association holds large stocks of leaf which will have to be exported, because Irish-grown tobacco bears a less tax in Great Britain than it does at home.

## INTERMEDIATE RESULTS.

### Big Proportion of Failures.

The results of the Intermediate Certificate Examination for boys were published yesterday. There were 1,834 students examined, of whom 335 passed with honours and 631 passed. The proportion per cent of those examined who passed was 52.7.

The results of the Leaving Certificate Examinations for boys and the Leaving and Intermediate Certificate Examinations for girls have already been published.

## COUNTY LIMERICK NUN'S DEATH IN AMERICA.

An American exchange to hand gives a touching account of the death and obsequies at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, of Sister Mary Elizabeth Toomey, a native of Dinoman, Croon, Co. Limerick, which occurred recently.

The report states:—Sister Elizabeth had undergone a serious operation in Chicago a week before the date of her death. Up to Wednesday morning Sister Elizabeth seemed to be making steady progress towards recovery. A change for the worse took place in her condition early Wednesday morning, resulting in her death at 5 p.m. Wednesday.
