

PROHIBITION IN AMERICA.

Bishop's Condemnation.

That prohibition is attended with innumerable evils and is bound to have a malevolent influence on a country is (writes the "Daily Mail") the opinion of the Bishop of Boston (Mass.), Dr. J. C. Anderson, who has arrived at the Savoy Hotel, London, after an extended tour of Europe. The Bishop has been on a pilgrimage to the Pope at Rome, to whom he took 100 pilgrims from Boston.

Bishop Anderson is America's 69 years young Bishop—no one ever takes him for more than 35 or 40. He attributes his youthfulness to golf.

On prohibition the Bishop has strong views. He said to a reporter:—

"I think it has created a new criminal class and is detrimental to the best interests of a country. Now the better class of our people are realising that the law ought to be changed. It was passed really as a war measure, but what do we see to-day as a result of it? We see any amount of corruption and we see a large amount of money being spent on our Army and Navy and police forces to enforce the prohibition laws.

"What is more, we see our own officers of the law being corrupted—bought by the rum-runners. It is not our goals that are so full, but our hospitals—so much impure liquor is being made. Everybody now knows how liquor can be made.

"I feel the time is coming when light wines and beers will have to be allowed—that amendment could easily be made to the constitutional law. Prohibition was a law made by extreme zealots, and a law likely to jeopardise a country."

DEATH OF MR H. J. GUINANE.

The death of Mr Henry J. Guinane, which took place at 78 Morehampton-road, Dublin, has been learned with sincere regret in his native city of Limerick. The deceased gentleman was in his eighty-second year. He was for more than thirty years Clerk of the Limerick Board of Guardians, and five years ago he resigned that office, and then went to reside in Dublin. The late Mr Guinane was member of an old Limerick family. He was a capable and courteous public official, and possessed high literary tastes, which were very frequently manifested when he presided at lectures and debates in the Catholic Literary Institute, of which he was for many years vice-president. His son, Mr H. J. Guinane, is connected with Messrs. Eason's, of Dublin, Bookstalls Department.

The remains reached Limerick at 2 o'clock yesterday, for interment in Mount St Laurence Cemetery.

The chief mourners were—Messrs. Henry J. David, and Albert (sons), Agnes and Alice (daughters), and John Guinane (nephew).

The officiating clergy were Rev. Fr. Thornhill, C.C., and Rev. Fr. Hannon, C.C., St. Michael's.
