### Decline Wages Offer.

The advertisement of Messrs. Siemens Schuckert offering for 3,000 unskilled labourers for the Shannon scheme and the wages offered were the subject of much discussion yesterday in Labour circles in the city of Dublin.

During the day the National Executive Council of the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union considered the matter and issued a statement notifying all members that the wage offered for work on the Shannon scheme had not been agreed to by the Union.

The leading official of the Transport Union said to the "Irish Times" reporter that the free lodging offered would work out very cheaply; 5s a week would be an outside estimate of its value, especially where a large number of men are concerned. The fact that the men will be housed on the job will be a distinct advantage to the contractor, and will facilitate in getting the work done speedily.

### Situation To day.

The position underwent no change to-day, and when seen the Mayor (Councillor O'Brien) declined to make any statement relative to his conversation yesterday with Dr. T. MacLoughlin. While the statement of the Transport and General Workers' Union expresses the official view of organized labour, it is an open secret that the contractors will have very little difficulty in procuring all the skilled labour they require, as numerous applications have been received from all over the country. It would create no surprise if work was started on the project early next week at the rate pay and conditions advertised.

## CHEAPER CLOTHES.

### A Tailor's Record.

Anything that cheapens the cost of living in these times of stress, is doubly welcome. Our readers will be interested in the report that retail quotations have become easier, and that transactions are taking place at lower prices than those obtaining hitherto. It is, however, stated in some trade quarters, that it will take three months for this reduction to reach the public on account of the cost of clothing.

In an interview with Mr. Hipps—who thirty years ago was the pioneer in selling tailor-made garments direct from his tailoring workshops, to the public—our Representative was informed that it was his intention to give the public the fullest advantage of the price concessions obtained on raw material, at once. He remarks that the sale of his operations was so large that each season's stock of cloth was sold.
