DEATH OF CANON O'DONNELL, P.P., KILDIMO.

Much regret is felt throughout the diocese of Limerick at the death of the Very Rev Canon John O'Donnell, P.P., Kildimo and Pallaskenry, which took place at the Presbytery, Kildimo, on Thursday. Born near Killbane 63 years ago, Canon O'Donnell served in various parishes of the diocese. About 20 years ago he was appointed parish priest of Killesdy, and some three years later was transferred to the united parishes of Kildimo and Pallaskenry. About twelve months ago he was appointed Canon of the Diocesan Chapter.

At 11 o'clock this morning Office and Requiem High Mass was celebrated at Pallaskenry for the repose of the soul of the lamented clergyman.

The Bishop Most Rev Dr Keane presided, and the celebrant was Rev Fr Hayes, P.P. Stonehall; deacon, Very Rev Canon Lee, P.P. Killbane; sub-deacon, Rev Fr O'Shea, P.P. Gille, and master of ceremony Rev F. MacNamara, C.C. St John's.

There was a large number of clergy in the choir.
