A sentence of nine months was passed by Judge McElligott at Ennis Circuit Court yesterday on a young man, John O'Brien, convicted of house-breaking, violence, and larceny.

The prisoner had been charged with breaking and entering four houses in the vicinity of Sixmile-bridge, but on the direction of the Court he was found not guilty on three counts

In the case in which he was convicted, the evidence showed that, with three companions, he called at the house of an old man, Michael Naughton, at 2 o'clock on the morning of the 8th March last, and demanded admittance. The old man inquired who was at the door, and received the reply "Police." He admitted the party. All of them, save the prisoner, had their faces blackened and carried short sticks. Whilst one acted as sentry at the door, the others searched the entire house, broke open boxes, tossed the beds, and stole sheets, tobacco, razors, and a pen-knife. The prisoner struck the old man with a stick and blackened both his eyes.

After two hours' search the prisoner sat down and ate a home-made cake and drank all the milk in the house.

He then informed Naughton that he had raided the wrong house, and insisted on shaking hands with him. When leaving he took two fresh candles, stating that he had orders to raid another house that night. It was not until some considerable time later that the Guards succeeded in tracing the prisoner to a house in a wood at Portane.

When arrested he gave his name as O'Brien, from Ireland. Throughout the hearing he adopted an air of bravado.

A long record of previous convictions was read out, including sentences in England and Northern Ireland, with a conviction in the United States for "bootlegging."

FALLING TREE

Causes Fatal Accident.

While engaged in felling trees on the Glenstal estate, Murroe, on Tuesday, Thomas Collins, aged 45 years, was struck by a heavy branch and killed outright. The deceased, who was a native of Cappanuke, was employed with two others by the steward of the estate, and in felling one of the trees swung back and struck Collins violently. The deceased was a married man, and leaves a wife and three children to mourn his loss.
