HON. GERALD FITZGERALD.

Late Land Commissioner Dead.

The Hon. Gerald Fitzgerald, K.C., late Judicial Land Commissioner, died yesterday, aged 76. A son of the late Lord Fitzgerald, of Kilmarnock, who was for many years a Judge of the King's Bench, and afterwards became a Lord of Appeal in Ordinary, the Hon. Gerald Fitzgerald was educated at Oxford. He filled the position of County Court Judge until 1890, when he was appointed a Commissioner under the Land Act.
