

SHANNON SCHEME

Another Steamer Arrives.

Early yesterday morning, another steamer, the "Lauriston" belonging to an English company, arrived in port with a cargo of 2,000 tons of machinery and constructional material for the contractors of the Shannon scheme, making the third in five weeks.

COUNTY DISTRICT SESSIONS.

Mr J M Flood, District Justice, adjudicated at the County District Sessions yesterday.

Hanora Hayer, publican, Doon, was prosecuted for a breach of the Licensing Law, on the 10th October, when according to the evidence of Hergt Higgins four people were found on the licensed premises near midnight. Three belonged to a Cinema Company, and the other was a resident of the village.

The defence was that all were members of the Cinema Company and stayed in the house.

In the circumstances the prosecution was dismissed.

Terence Ercsey, publican, also of Doon, was prosecuted for a like offence on the 17th ult, when Sergeant Higgins on entering the premises during prohibited hours found two men in the bar.

It was stated by the defendant that one of the men was a traveller, and the other was a friend who was in the habit of visiting the house.

The prosecution was dismissed.

Mr Flood presented the medal of the Royal Humane Society to Sergeant Higgins for his activities in preventing cruelty to animals, and the recipient suitably replied.

Edward Campbell was charged with assaulting John Loughrey at Cappamore on the 7th instant.

On the morning in question the parties were at Cappamore Creamery, and, following an argument, Campbell took up the lid of a milk tankard and struck the prosecutor with it on the head, causing a deep incision, from which blood flowed freely. The assault was the sequel to political arising out of the civil trouble.

Mr M Tynan, solicitor, appeared for the defendant, and produced evidence to show that there was nothing political in the squabble, and that Loughrey had contributed largely to the assault by his demeanour towards Campbell, with whom he had not been for some time friendly.

The defendant was ordered to pay a fine of 20s and costs.

DEATH OF MR D McCANN.

The death took place on Tuesday, at his residence in Youghal of Mr David McCann, who many years ago was manager of the National Bank, Limerick, subsequently retiring from the service on pension. He was very highly esteemed by the business community, and the news of his demise will be heard of with regret by many old friends in this city.

Wherever there was fighting to be done, the Irish were there, whether on the Somme, the Aisne, or the Struma. These soldiers were all volunteers, and in the years to come they would take their proper place in the Government of their country and in the management of their local affairs. They had already done something by placing their President, Major-General Sir William Hickie, at the head of the poll at the recent Senate elections. (Applause.)

Captain Pizee gave the health of Major Barrington, who, he said, was the very soul of the Limerick Branch of the British Legion. He could not describe the work he had done for ex-Servicemen and the Club, and to him they owed a debt which they could never repay. (Applause.)

The toast having been honoured with enthusiasm, Major Barrington in reply said Sunday's parade of ex-Servicemen had filled him with pleasure. It was a wonderful display, and had astonished the citizens of Limerick. It was a great honour to him to head that parade, and he could only express the hope that next year's parade would be twice as large. (Applause.)

The proceedings then terminated.
