RESOLUTIONS OF THE COUNCIL IN RELATION TO THE ROAD ACTS, 1920 AND 1921 AND THE ROAD (MOTOR VEHICLES) ACT, 1920.

The County Council, in pursuance of powers vested in them under the (Registration and Licensing) Act, 1920, and under the Roads Act, 1920, and the Motor Vehicles Act, 1920, do hereby resolve that the owners of Mechanically Propelled Road Vehicles which are ordinarily kept within the County of Waterford, that immediate steps be taken to enforce payment of all outstanding arrears of licence fees on same.

Such arrears can be paid through the post, or by cheque, and on Saturdays between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m.

For a Declaration Form, on which a licence must be made, the applicant must state the kind of vehicle for which a licence is required.

Postal Orders in payment of licence fees should be made payable to "The County Council," and crossed "Licences."

Mechanically Propelled Road Vehicles are hereby notified that the Licence required therefor must be carried in the approved position on the vehicle when it is being used on a public road.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE COUNCIL.

Form No. 3.
Government (Collection of Rates) Act, 1924.

Whereas it is hereby given that the Minister of the Government, in pursuance of the Statute in this behalf, has by Order in Council on the 15th day of June, 1924, applied the provisions of the Local Government (Collection of Rates) Act, 1924 (No. 11 of 1924) to the County of Waterford, being a Local Government in the meaning of the said Act. And whereas powers vested in the Minister for the time being by the said Section, the Minister has empowered to issue warrants to the effect of the County authorising him to take proceedings in accordance with the provisions of the said Act in relation to the Poor Rate or other Rate payable by ratepayers who have made default in the payment of the Poor Rate (or other rate) made payable by them on the 1st day of March, 1924, or any other day in the financial year, whose names have been included in the list in accordance with the provisions of the said Act.

And whereas the powers of all ratepayers in default in the payment of the Poor Rate or other Rate are hereby given to the Under-Secretary of the County Council, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act.

MR MACNEILL'S EDUCATIONAL POLICY.

On Friday Mr John MacNeill, the Minister of Education, began his reply in the Dail to criticisms that had been passed on his educational policy.

He declared his policy to be the conservation and development of Irish nationality and the relation between his Department and the Ministers of Lands and Commerce. His policy, he declared, was founded upon faith in the future of the nation, in its development and for repairing the damage that it had suffered since the national educational system was established.

NEWLY MARRIED LADY'S TRAGEDY.

The tragic story of the death of a young lady, Mrs Lynch, wife of a Customs Officer residing at College-road, Cork, was told at the inquest on last Saturday. It appears she had been deceased, while hanging curtains, fell from the windows on to the tiled balcony, where she was found by her maid, who was attracted by screams.
