sequence, the Ministry has issued an Order restricting the movement of cattle within an area which includes the whole of the North Riding, the City of York, part of the West Riding (including Harrogate and Ripon Boroughs), Durham County, and Newcastle and Tynemouth Boroughs.

Within a two-mile radius of the infected farms, the movement of cattle under any circumstances is prohibited.

All hunting in the counties mentioned has been suspended.

Nearly 100 meets which had been arranged for this week in the Yorkshire districts will be affected by this new Order.

RESTRICTIONS WITHDRAWN.

The Ministry of Agriculture has withdrawn the stand-still restrictions from the Counties of Cambridge, the Isle of Ely, Huntingdon, and the Soke of Peterborough, and also from those parts of Lincolnshire which are not within the infected area declared in connection with the recent outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease at Thornton near Horncastle.

SHANNON DROWNING FATALITY.

The body of the man recovered from the Shannon at Caherdavin on Saturday evening, was taken to the County Infirmary morgue and identified as that of James Butler, 32 Taylor's-row, City. The deceased was 73 years of age, and was in receipt of an old-age pension. He was by occupation a pork butcher, and it was stated at the formal inquest yesterday, held by Dr M. R. Clery, county coroner, that he had been in the habit of taking a walk by the river bank, and probably missed his footing and fell into the water. Dr C. Moloney, house surgeon, County Infirmary, attributed death to shock and heart failure following immersion in the river, and a verdict was entered accordingly.
