LECTURE AT CATHOLIC INSTITUTE.

The Rev W. O'Dwyer, P.P., St. Patrick's,
 presided at a lecture, entitled "Religious and
 National Movements in Ireland," delivered to
 a crowded audience at the Catholic Institute
 by the Rev P. Power, Professor, Maynooth
 College, and University College, Cork. In
 the course of his address the lecturer, by the
 aid of a splendid series of lantern slides,
 showed the process of ecclesiastical con-
 struction in Ireland from the earliest times.
 He described the monastic cells on the
 islands off the western seaboard, and gave a
 lucid description of Clonmacnoise, the ruins
 of Glendalough, and the Rock of Cashel,
 with special allusion to King Cormac's
 Chapel.

At the conclusion, the lecturer was thanked
