### DEATH OF MR J. A. HENNESSY.

The death, which we announce with regret, took place suddenly on Saturday night at his residence, North Strand, of Mr James A. Hennessy, building contractor, in his sixtieth year. The deceased, although out on Saturday, had not been in the best of health for some time, and his demise has occasioned deep regret in the city. He was an ex-member of the Borough Council and chairman of the City Executive of Sinn Fein, in which movement he played a prominent part during the Anglo-Irish trouble. Mr Hennessy was a keen business man, and in municipal affairs his counsel and advice were ever valued by his colleagues.

#### The Funeral.

The remains were interred to-day in Mount St Laurence Cemetery. This morning Requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of the soul of the deceased in St Munchin's Church, whither the remains were removed last night. The funeral cortege was large and representative, and as such was a striking tribute of respect to the memory of the deceased, who was a well-known figure in the city, and who by his sterling honesty of purpose as a citizen endeared himself to a wide circle of friends.
