We regret to announce the death of Mr Daniel Foley, which took place yesterday at his residence, Mallow. The deceased was for many years manager of the Condensed Milk Company's factory in that town, and in that capacity he discharged his duties with ability and the utmost regard for the interests of his firm. The late Mr Foley was a native of Limerick, being brother of Mr J. J. Foley, forage contractor, and of Mr M. Foley, cattle dealer, Thomondgate. His demise has been learned with deep sorrow, not alone in Mallow but in his native city. The remains will arrive in Limerick tomorrow night at 7.45 o'clock, and the funeral will leave St Munchin's Catholic Church after Requiem High Mass at 12 o'clock on Thursday for Mount St Laurence Cemetery.
