DEATH OF MR M. O'SULLIVAN.

The death took place at No. 6 Wellington Terrace on yesterday morning of Mr Michael O'Sullivan at an advanced age, and after an illness of rather brief duration. The deceased was for a number of years an official of the Irish Prisons Board, and retired from the service eleven years ago. At the time of his retirement, under the age limit, Mr O'Sullivan was Governor of Limerick County Prison, and occupied that important position for a considerable number of years, having been transferred from Belfast where he was deputy governor. The deceased was during his long official life held in the utmost respect and esteem by the authorities, and the prisoners that came under his charge had always words of kindness for him. In private life the late Mr O'Sullivan was a great favourite, and in the city he counted upon a large number of friends who deeply regret his demise and extend sincere sympathy to his relatives in their bereavement.

The remains were removed to St. Michael's Church last evening, and this morning left by the 10.25 train for Castleisland, where the interment is to take place.

DEATH OF REV. T. KANE, O.S.B.
