KILMALLOCK FAIRS.

Town Tenants' Association and the Green.

At a meeting of the Kilmallock Town
Tenants, Mr C. O'Callaghan, presiding, Mr
D. O'Grady, M.C.C., mentioned the subject
of the local fair green, and a lengthy exchange
of views followed, in the course of which
tributes were paid to the members of the
Fair Green Committee, all of whom are now
dead, for their services to the town. It was
recalled that, with the object of putting the
fairs on a popular basis, they acquired this
field, became liable for the cost of same, and
with the acclaim of the people, had the fairs
transferred to it. They then formed them-
selves into a Town Improvement Committee,
and from the revenue derived from the fairs
did much for the betterment of the
town, including the public lighting of
the streets, which, however, they were
obliged to discontinue when the fairs
were removed to the town and their
resources curtailed, no tolls being then forth-
coming. For years the controversy existed,
and all efforts towards a settlement were
nullified, but ultimately the matter fell into
obeyance. In the meantime, members of
the improvement committee passed away,
and the last of them, before his death, made
a will dealing with the field. This was now
the subject of consideration. It was pointed
out that the Green could be utilised to
advantage by having the fairs held there
instead of in the town, which was quite un-
suited to the purpose, and where they were
a source of danger to the public health. It
was also mentioned that had the field been
available as a site for houses, many could
have been provided under a recent Act of
Parliament.

Ultimately it was decided that those con-
cerned would confer as to what could be done
to give effect to the views that had been
advanced.
