accused was under the influence of drink.

The defendant said that he was informed that his wife was beaten by Tuohy and his companions, and he struck him only once.

Mr Flood said Tuohy appeared to have received a bad beating. He would have to put a stop to those tinker fights in the city, and he would sentence the accused to six weeks' imprisonment, the sentence to run from date of arrest.

A young girl named Elizabeth Casey was charged with issuing and presenting for payment a cheque for £24 16s. 3d., and attempting to obtain that sum by false pretences from the Bank of Ireland, O'Connell street, Limerick, on the 15th April, and with stealing the cheque from Mrs M. E. Taylor, 6 Eden Terrace.

Supt. O'Reilly prosecuted, and Mr N. Gaffney, solr., appeared for the accused.

An official of the Bank of Ireland, Lime- rick, stated that on the 15th April another official brought under his notice the cheque (produced). The cheque was purported to be signed by M. E. Taylor. Witness asked the defendant what the money was for, and she replied for wages. He knew the signature of Mrs Taylor. The signature on the cheque did not resemble that of Mrs Taylor.

Mr T. Rea, another official in the Bank, stated that at about 2.15 on the day in question the accused came into the Bank and presented the cheque, which he initialled. He asked her if she wanted cash for it, and she replied that she did. Witness thought the cheque was not genuine, and he drew the attention of the sub-manager to it.

In reply to Mr Gaffney, witness said the space for the amount of the cheque which should be in writing was in figures.

Mrs Stack stated that she saw the cheque and the handwriting on it was not that of Mrs Taylor, but that of the accused. The accused was employed by Mrs Taylor as a general servant. The cheque must have been removed from Mrs Taylor's writing desk. The accused had no authority to take the cheque. The accused admitted to witness that she took the cheque to the Bank, being influenced by a man named Tuohy.

Accused who reserved her defence was returned for trial in personal bail of £40 and two sureties of £20 each.

Mr. P. O'Donnell, Solicitor, on behalf of David Donnelly "merry go round" proprietor, who is at present giving entertainments at the Ennis Road, applied for a licence under the Public Health Act. He said he did so because of a letter from the City Surveyor, and though he thought no such licence was necessary he desired to keep within the law.

Superintendent O'Reilly said as it was an open air entertainment the licence was not necessary, but he hoped the amusement would not continue the whole summer as there was a lot of boys doing damage to hoardings etc.

Mr. Flood marked the application "no jurisdiction," expressing at the same time that the venue of the entertainment was not the most suitable.

CORK MENTAL HOSPITAL COMMITTEE SURCHARGES.

Three surcharges made by the L.G.D. auditor against Cork Mental Hospital Com- mittee were discharged on consideration by the L.G. Department. They were eight payments, making £35 odd, superannuation allowances to ex-attendants in excess of statute amount; £76, portion of gratuity to the widow of an officer in excess of legal amount; £11 odd in respect to a coal con- tract. The auditor was held to be justified in making the surcharges, but on considera- tion of all the facts the discharge is made.

THE SHANNON TOWING FATALITY.

Inquest and Verdict.

Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, resumed the inquest at Barrington's Hospital, Limerick, last evening, on Michael Mescall, master of the smack "Edgar," who died on the seventh instant from injuries sustained in a towing accident on the Shannon on the 20th April.

Mr P. J. O'Sullivan, solicitor, appeared for the next of kin of deceased.

Dr. W. P. Dundon, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, stated that deceased was admitted to the institution on the 20th ult., and died on the seventh instant from shock and loss of blood as result of the injuries he received to the right foot, which was severed.

Patrick McMahon, master of the "Corona," deposed to taking the smack "Edgar" in tow on the 20th April about two miles from Limerick. After the tow rope had been fastened it suddenly slackened, and witness then learned that something had gone wrong. He brought the "Corona" alongside the smack, and was informed that the deceased's right foot had been taken off by the rope. He was taken back to the city and then to hospital.

Stephen Rohan, deck hand on the steamer "Corona," stated on the date in question they took the "Edgar" in tow a mile and a half from Limerick. When they had thirty- five fathoms of rope out and it became taut he saw a hand waving from the "Edgar." The anchor was dropped, and he then learned that Michael Mescall was injured, the right leg having been severed by the rope above the ankle.

Joseph Millar, in his evidence, stated that he lived at 16 Upper Henry street, and was by occupation a docker. He was on board the "Edgar" on the 20th ult., going to Carrigaholt, with the deceased, his son, John Mescall, and witness's brother, Harry Millar. When they had got a mile and a half from the city they were overtaken by the "Corona" which took the "Edgar" in tow. Deceased paid out the rope, and in doing so the deceased's right leg got caught in a coil. Witness shouted to the crew of the "Corona," but they did not hear him, but before he could procure a hatchet to cut the rope deceased's leg was severed. The "Corona" then came alongside, and deceased's thigh having been tied up to prevent loss of blood, he was taken back to the quay.

The jury found that Michael Mescall died from shock and hæmorrhage, the result of injuries accidentally sustained.

DEATH OF MRS. BOYD.

We regret to announce the death of Mrs Boyd, widow of Mr John Boyd, formerly Secretary of the Limerick Harbour Board, which took place to-day at Sunville, North Circular-road. Mrs Boyd had been in fail- ing health for some considerable time past, and her demise will occasion deep sorrow in Limerick and elsewhere to a wide circle of friends, by whom she was highly esteemed for her bright, genial, and hospitable manner. She was the only sister of the late Sir Thomas H. Cleve and of Mr F. C. Cleve, and for many years resided at Rose Hill, North Strand.

Funeral for St. Mary's Cathedral at 2.30 on Monday afternoon.
