### Mr Daniel D. J. Leahy.

Numerous friends in the city have heard with sincere regret of the unexpected demise of Mr Daniel D. J. Leahy, which took place this morning at his residence, Beverley, South Circular Road, after about five days illness. He was a prominent and courteous official in the Customs and Excise Department of the Inland Revenue, Limerick, having for thirteen years held the position of Indoor Surveyor. He had previously been stationed at Hull, and at his own request, owing to his strong attachment to his native country—he was a West Limerick man—was transferred to this city. He was held in the highest esteem and regard by his brother officials and the general public, and there is deep sympathy with his widow and family in their sorrow. One of his sons is a Priest in the Southwark diocese, another is completing his studies for the Priesthood, while a third has entered for the Irish Bar. Mr Leahy was a man of a retiring disposition, kindly and charitable, and was a prominent member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, being Secretary of St. Michael's Conference.
