

George McElhigott opened the criminal case of the County at 11 o'clock day morning.

Henry Mulvihill was arraigned and pleaded guilty to setting fire to a rick of hay the property of John Looby, at Brucee, and was convicted.

David Horan, Newcastle West, pleaded guilty to the embezzlement of £70, the property of the Inland Revenue Commissioners. J. J. Power, State Solicitor, said the accused had made amends to a certain extent, and would, he understood, repay the amount involved.

The Lordship adjourned the case to next sittings, and allowed the accused out on his recognisances of £20 in the meantime. Edward O'Hanlon, Ballyguiltinan, Glin, charged and pleaded guilty to the abduction of a girl aged 15 years.

Imposing a sentence of two years' hard labour, the judge said that accused was a wicked man, who had deserted his wife and children. He richly deserved the sentence meted out to him.

Thomas O'Hanlon and Patrick O'Hanlon, charged and pleaded guilty to harbouring Edward O'Hanlon, were next put forward.

Mr M. Tynan, solicitor, represented on their behalf that they did not know the girl's age. The Lordship—I will give them a month's imprisonment each, and I think they have come off very light.

Thomas Fitzgerald, motor driver, was charged and pleaded not guilty to the manslaughter of Anna Cleary at Knockaney on 14th April.

Mr J. J. Power, County State Solicitor, prosecuted in this and other criminal cases. The accused was defended by Mr J. J. Tynan (instructed by Mr Roger Fox, solicitor).

Sergeant Hurley, Knockaney, gave measurements of the by-road leading to Knockaney Creamery, in which Anna Cleary met her death. The office of the creamery was demolished by the impact of the lorry driven by the accused, and there was a quantity of blood on the ground near where deceased was struck by the vehicle. He arrested Thomas Fitzgerald, and after being cautioned and asked he replied, "I have nothing to say about what I said at the inquest."

In answering counsel, the sergeant stated that deceased was perfectly sober, and deceased came to the creamery that morning for milk.

Thomas Clancy, an engine driver, employed at Knockaney Creamery, deposed he was standing on the milk platform on the morning of the 14th April, about 11 o'clock, and the creamery lorry approach the gate, driven by the accused. The vehicle was moving slowly, but quickened as it came near the creamery. He heard a crash and
