WEST LIMERICK FATALITY.

Farm Labourer Killed by Lightning.

A heavy thunderstorm broke over Charleville and district in the early hours of Sunday morning and continued until afterseven o'clock. On Sunday night thunder, and lightning was followed by a torrential downpour of rain, which lasted through the night. Inquiries made yesterday morning elicited the fact that considerable damage was done in districts to the west of Charleville.
