## THE BANK HOLIDAY.

His son, Mr Tom O'Donovan, is secretary of the Limerick Branch of the Licensed Grocers and Vintners' Association. The late Mr O'Donovan, who was nephew of the late Mr Wm. Lloyd, wine merchant, of this city, was very highly esteemed in Limerick and the adjoining counties, where as a commission agent he was widely known. The funeral, which took place from St Munchin's Catholic Church on Sunday morning to Mount St. Laurence, was large and representative.
