30th, the four counties at the top of the list were Dublin, £587,997; Cork, £337,264; Limerick, £126,904; Tipperary, £100,855. If the investment per 1,000 of population was staken the order was different—viz., Dublin, £1,229; Limerick, £881; Cork, £853; Wicklow, £845. The Governor-General declared he had heard the figures with great pleasure.

## The Weather.

The long spell of fine weather, with, as a rule, bright sunshine, was to some extent broken by a heavy rainfall during to-day. It was not, however, regretted, as the air which was sultry and relaxing during the past few days, has become fresher and more buoyant. Again, the moisture has benefitted the pastures, which presented a rather dried-up appearance of late.

## DEATH OF MRS. BUNBURY.

We regret to record the death, which took place yesterday at her residence. Eden Terrace, of Mrs Bunbury, widow of the Right Rev. Thomas Bunbury, D.D., Bishop of Limerick, 1899-1907. The deceased lady, who had attained the fine old age of 90 years, had been in failing health for some time past. She was of a very kindly and retiring disposition, and in her day was associated with works of charity and benevo-I nee in the city, where, as in the County Limerick, she was held in high regard and e teem by a wide circle of friends. Mrs Bunbury was mother of Brigadier-General Vesey Bunbury, and of the late Major-General W. E. Burbury, C.B., who died in October last. Funeral will arrive at St. Mary's Cathedral at 11.30 on Monday next.
