REGISTRAR-GENERAL'S REPORT. Statistics are, as a rule, dry reading, but those contained in the quarterly return of the Registrar-General are of general interest to the community. The period covered ended the 31st March last, and throws some light on the increase in the population, as shown by a comparison of the births and cleaths. While there were 14.831 births

registered in the Saorstat, the deaths numbered 11,594 only, or 3,237 less in number than the births, which were equivalent to an annual rate of 18'8 per 1,000 of the estimated population, while the deaths represented 14.7. The number of marriages registered during the fourth quarter of 1925, was 2,875, equivalent to an annual rate of 3'8 per 1,000 of the estimated population, but 0'3 below the. average for the fourth quarter of the ten years 1916-25. As returned by the Registrars, the number of successful primary vaccinations during the quarter under notice was 7,849, which would go to show that this essential precaution against infection is being generally observed as it should be. A comparison with England and Scotland is interesting. During the thirteen weeks ended 3rd April, 1926, the births in London were equivalent to a rate of 18'0 per 1,000 of the population : in Glasgow the rate was 24'6 per 1,000, and in Edinburgh 19'3 per 1,000. The Meteorological Review for the Irish Free State recalls the fact that January was mild on the whole and very wet. Snow fell heavily about the middle of the month, but the cold spell was less severe than in England. Very mild and dull weather prevailed, with little intermission, during the month of February, and while the first week of the month was the wettest generally, the second week was the driest. March was on the whole mild, though not so much so as in February, but the outstanding features of March were its dryness. THE LATE CANON CREGAN.

The Funeral. The Very Rev. James Canon Cregan, P.P., V.F., St. Munchin's, whose death we announced with deep regret in our late ledition on Saturday evening, was a native of Newcastle West, Co. Limerick. He was educated in the Irish College ili Paris while he was ordafted at the age of 24. His first offacty was in St. Mary's, Limerick, whence he was transferred to St. John's, and thonce to St. Michael's, of which parish he became administrator. Later he was appointed parish priest of Athea, and subsequently of Abbeyfeale, where later Bishop O'Dwycr appointed him a member of the Cathedral Chapter. Two and a half years ago he was feansferred to the pastorship of St. Munchin's, where the present Bishop, Dr. Keane, conferred on him the degree of VaF. terred on him the degree of Var.

The late Canon Cregan was identified with many social works in the city, foremost affongst which was the establishment of St. Ita's House, for the educational and

industrial welfare of young girls. also conspicuous in the formation of women's temperance sodalities. He was one of the most esteemed clergymen in the diocese of Limerick, and his death was learned with keen sorrow by all classes was learned with keen sorrow by all classes and creeds in the city and throughout the diocese. The rev. gentleman had been in delicate health for some time past, and his demise, which occurred at the Convalescent Home, Milford House, on Saturday evening, was not an expected. He was äged 69.

The deceased gentleman, who was eldest son of the late Win. Morony, of Fortlawn, Co. Mayo, was also connected by marriage with the Morony family of Odel Ville, Bellingarry, and most of his professional life was spent and most of his professional life was in this city. Thirty-seven years ago he was elected Harbour Engineer of this port in sticession to the late Mr. Wm. J. Hall, and in his time he carried out various improve-ment schemes in connection with the docks and harbour. He designed and carried out the erection of the new swing, bridge at Sarsfield street. He also carried out an extensive scheme of inchcutting at the Docks which resulted in the easier docking of vessels with large draft entering the ot vessels with large draft entering the Docks, particularly during the period of winter freshets. MARTYR TO RADIUM.

Paris Sunday-The death of Dr Maxim Menard deprives France of one of her most brilliant X-Ray experts. Ever since 1909 he was head of the Radio-Electrical Depart ment of the Cochin Hospital. Even at that time he had begun to suffer from the effect of the X-Rays. During the war he took charge of the services of 30 ambulances, examining over 100 almost every day. In 1925 it became necessary to remove an eye, and latterly his life was one long martyrdom, but he continued to receive his patients, treating a sufferer a week ago.
