He left £4,000 to his secretary, Robert Henry McCoy, if still in his service and not under notice. A life annuity of £100 to his nurse, Miss N. E. Roche; an annuity of £25 to his late wife's maid, Elizabeth Clarke; £200 each to his valet, William Fredk. Hasler, and his housekeeper, Mrs Jenkins, if respectively still in his service; £50 to Bartholomew Smith, formerly captain of Cariad; £50 each, if respectively still in his service, to Charles West, the sailing master of Sona, Charles Vine, and E. Betteridge, officers of Sona, and — Robertson, caretaker at Garrinish.

His racing cups not otherwise bequeathed are to go to his daughter, Lady Ardee, but he directed that the thoroughbreds at his stud farm in Ireland should form part of his residuary estate; to Clara, wife of Arthur Blennerhasset, he left £10,000, a life annuity of £1,500, his house, the Kenry House, Putney Vale and 22 Norfolk Street, Park Lane, and any other household houses in London, and certain of his household and personal effects and consumable stores, together with the use for life of Garrinish Island and other property in Dunkerran, Co. Kerry (including his boats there), with remainder to his daughter, Lady Ardee. He left £1,000 each to Christopher Henry Robinson and Capt. Ernest Threlfall Whitehead, as executors, and his sister, Lady Emily Wyndham-Quin; £500 to Mrs Amy Eden; £20,000 to his grandson, Desmond Fitzgerald; £10,000 to his son-in-law, Desmond FitzJohn Lloyd Fitzgerald, Knight of Glin; his holdings in the Dunraven Estates Co., Ltd., to the trustees of a settlement made in 1925, and he made heirlooms of various articles. The residue of the unsettled property he left to his daughter, Lady Ardee.
