LIVERPOOL TRAGEDY.

Clareman Killed

News reached Limerick on Mr John Corbett, a native of Clare, but resident in Limerick years, was killed in Liverpool evening last. It appears that who was a representative of Messrs Gallagher and Co., I manufacturers, Belfast, was at from a motor car with his only child, a little girl. The youngster crossed the street in front of him, and in endeavouring to overtake her he was run into by an oncoming lorry and killed. The deceased who was 50 years of age, was for a very long period manager of the Limerick Branch of Messrs Gallagher and Co., and was held in the highest esteem and respect in the city. He was married to a daughter of the late Mr Lawrence Carr, B.C., and last evening the remains passed through Limerick for interment in Kildysart.

Leads to Serious Altercation.

Our Ennis correspondent writes:—There was a rather serious termination to the partnership connected with the purchase and hire of a hair cutting machine which had a sequel at the Corofin District Court before Mr Gleeson, D.J. A young man named John Hurley, of the farm-

The Minister of Lands and Agriculture, at Newcastle West District Sessions, before Mr P. P. O'Donohue, District Justice, prosecuted Michael Liston, Garryduff, for taking milk to Garryduff Creamery in a tankard which the prosecution urged was unclean.

For the prosecution, Mr Harrington, Inspector to the Ministry, stated that on the 15th May last, at Garryduff Creamery, he examined two milk tankards belonging to defendant. He found that one of the vessels was dirty, the side of same containing slime. The other vessel was clean. He drew the attention of the manager to the fact, and he refused the milk. This was the first prosecution he had in this district.

Did you draw the attention of young Mr Liston to the state of the can?—Yes. He said it was cream.

District Justice—How long did the slime take to accumulate?—It took at least two days—probably three or four days.

Cross-examined by Mr Liston, solr.—One of the milk vessels was clean and the other dirty. There were pretty big patches of slime inside the can of the dirty vessel.

What did the slime appear to have been?—Decayed milk.

There was nothing deliberate about this?—I would say it was carelessness.

Mrs Liston, wife of defendant, stated that she used to clean and "scald" her milk vessels at regular periods. A little drain of milk would cause the discolouration, and on this particular day it was possible the can escaped her attention, but on that day the "dirty man," as he was called, was at the creamery. (Loud laughter.)

A fine of 10s and 20s costs was imposed.

MULCAIR DROWNING TRAGEDY.

Ex-Soldier's Body Recovered.

The body of Henry Garvey, who had been missing since Friday, was recovered from the Mulcair River last night, close to the place where his clothing was found when he went to bathe in the stream. The deceased, who was a single man, was an ex-British soldier, and lived with his mother in Henry street. The remains were removed to a farm house nearby, pending the holding of an inquest by the County Coroner.
