

## CHILD'S DEATH IN COUNTY LIMERICK.

### Inquest and Verdict.

The circumstances surrounding the death of a newly-born child were investigated at Knocklong by Coroner J. J. Cleary, M.D., and a jury of which Mr. P. Clery was foreman.

It appeared that a servant named Johanna O'Donnell in the employment of James Halpin, Baggstown, for the past three weeks, took ill on the 11th, and was taken to her sister's house at Corbally, between Knocklong and Galbally. After her departure when the condition of the room was noticed a report was made to the Civic Guard.

James Halpin, junior, deposed that the girl complained of rheumatic pains, but they did not notice her condition or suspect what was wrong until after her departure.

Superintendent Fleming gave evidence to the effect that he visited the house of James Halpin, made a search of the room and out-houses, after which he proceeded to Corbally and found the girl in her sister's house. He questioned her, and she admitted having given birth, secretly, to a baby at Halpin's house on the previous Wednesday night. He asked her where she put the baby, and she told him it was in her box under the bed. He took out the box, and found the body of a dead female child fully developed rolled up in a piece of cloth. The neck was blue, save for a small part at the back, and there was a little blood near the nostrils.

Dr. M. R. Cleary, Hospital, gave evidence of the result of the post-mortem made by him and Dr. John Cleary. He stated the child was born alive and breathed. It was fully matured. Death was due to asphyxia caused by strangulation.

Dr. John Cleary concurred.

The jury found accordingly, but by whom caused they had no evidence to show.

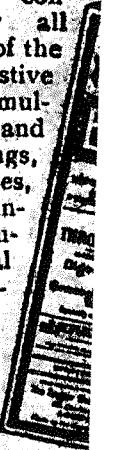
