burden of taxation. However, it is to be hoped that the land policy of the Ministry in creating more small holdings will help to bring back the rural population, and that industrial activity in the towns will serve to turn the tide of emigration.

DEFACING O'CONNELL MONUMENT.

The defacing of public monuments is a practice not generally prevalent in the city, but yesterday morning there was a departure from the rule. The plinth of the O'Connell statue in the Crescent at the West side contained a poster announcing a meeting to be held in the City by the Council of the Unemployed. This is, undoubtedly, a thing which the citizens will not approve, and is to be discountenanced.

THE LATE SENATOR O'MARA.

At a meeting of the Committee of the Limerick Commercial Travellers' Association held at Cruise's Hotel on Saturday night, Mr P. McMahon, P.C., President, in the chair, the following resolution was passed unanimously:—"That at this the first meeting of the Committee of the Limerick Commercial Travellers' Association since the lamented death of Senator Stephen O'Mara, we beg to tender to his family our deepest regret. We, as citizens, feel that our city has suffered a severe loss by the demise of a gentleman who loomed largely in the commercial and public life of Limerick."

ALLEGED LARCENY.

Last evening Guard Mulroy arrested Thomas Mason, a labourer, on a charge of stealing two pairs of boots, the property of Maurice O'Sullivan, High Street. He was taken before Mr. R. Slattery, Peace Commissioner, and remanded in Custody until Friday.

A married woman named Campbell collapsed in Sexton street yesterday morning, and passed away in a short time. The deceased, who lived at Mulgrave street, was returning to her home after completing work in one of the city offices, where she was employed as a charwoman. She was fifty-six years of age, and was removed in the Fire Brigade ambulance to her home.

MOTORING ACCIDENT.

Approaching a place called Beary's Cross, he passed a military lorry travelling at a rapid pace, and simultaneously the wind-screen of the motor-car was shattered. At the time the instructor thought the screen had been struck by a bullet, but enquiries revealed that a stone on the road was hit up by the lorry and caused the damage. The stone was found embedded in the car.
