scheme, it should be on the basis of a joint proposal, in which the administrative expenditure would be borne by the city and county. In this connection it would be advisable for the Government to adopt a line of action similar to that which induced them to bring about workhouse amalgumation.

## DEATH OF REV. DENIS TURNER, C.SS.R.

The death, which we regret to announce, took place at the Sacred Heart Convalescent Home, Castletroy, Limerick, last night, of Rev. Denis Turner, C.SS.R., where he had been seriously ill for the past month. During his illness Father Tyrner was visited by members of the Redemptorist community, and the end came peacefully. The late rev. gentleman was a well-known Redemptorist priest and missionary. He was born in Kilmallock about 55 years ago, and was brother of the Bishop of Buffalo, Most Rev. Dr. Turner, another brother being also in the sacred ministry. Father Turner was educated at Mungret College, from where he proceeded to the Redemptorists House of Studies, at Teignmouth, Devon. ompletion of his scholastic course he was ordained at Clonard Monastery, Belfast, and as preacher and missionary he was a familiar figure in the North and West of Ireland. In 1912 he was appointed Spiritual Director of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, St. Alphonsus Church, Limerick, for the brief period of six months, when he returned to Belfast as Rector, and subsequently he was Rector of St Patrick's, Esker, Athenry. About six years ago he was transferred to Limerick, where he was Rector up to three years ago. His health, never robust, then became impaired, and he was only a short time home from Rome when he had a breakdown, and was removed to the Sacred Heart Convalescent Home. Futher Turner was a distinguished member of his Order, simple and unaffected in manner, with a gracious disposition which won the hearts and affection of all with whom he came into The remains were removed to contact. Mount St. Alphonsus Church this evening, and the obsequies will take place at 11 'clock to-morrow morning.
