Subsequently the members of the Association of Chambers of Commerce and friends visited the Shannon Power Works at Ardacrusha, being taken out by bus and motor cars, kindly placed at their disposal by the members of the Limerick Chamber. The weather was beautifully fine, and the visit proved interesting, instructive, and educative from every point of view. After the whole party, numbering a hundred and fifty, having a luncheon, at which Mr F. J. Cleve, resident of the Limerick Chamber, presided, was served in one of the spacious departments contiguous to the chief works. The catering was in the hands of Mr Henry Conings, who supplied an excellent lunch, the service being expeditious, and in that respect a tribute was, at the close, paid to the assistance given by the "amateur waiters," sons of some of the members of the Limerick Chamber.

Luncheon over, the President introduced Mr McGilligan, Minister of Industry and Commerce, who, on rising to speak, was received with the utmost cordiality. In the course of his remarks the Minister said at the outset he desired to express a thought that was common to each and everyone of them; that was to convey their deep gratitude to the Limerick Chamber of Commerce for their invitation to them to visit the Shannon scheme works under the pleasant conditions they had experienced. The gathering, representative of all parts of Ireland, was going to see one of the greatest constructive works ever attempted in their country. They would see it at somewhat of an advanced stage as far as one portion of the work was concerned. It may not be apparent to the ordinary lay eye, but, speaking from inside knowledge of what had happened, he wanted to emphasise the fact that not one false step had been made in the carrying out of the constructional side of the scheme so far.
