portant centre like Limerick. Another matter of importance to the citizens to which attention was directed, and it is high time this has been done, is the closing of the General Post Office at 7 p.m. This arrange ment places Limerick on the same level as a country town, and both as regards postal and telegraph business is highly inconvenient to the public. The Post Office should certainly be open for some time longer at night, and now that the Society is taking the matter up with the Postal Authorities it is to be hoped the concession asked for will be granted without delay. On the whole the Society has given an excellent account of its stewardship. It is satisfactory to see that its work is becoming more and more appreciated, as increased membership proves, and under the able and painstaking guidance of Dr. Fogerty, as chairman, we feel assured the Society will carry on its activities with unabated interest and zeal in the year that is before it,

DEATH OF VERY REV. CANON GRIFFIN, P.P., ADARE.

The death took place at the Parochial House, Adare, on Tuesday night, of the Very Rev. John Canon Griffin, P.P., Adare, in his seventieth year, and following an illness of three months' duration. Canon Griffin was born in Ardagh, and was ordained in 1883, after which he ministered in Monaghan for a brief period before being recalled to St. John's Cathedral Parish as curate. On the translation of the late Rev. Timothy Lee as P.P. of Croom, the late Canon was appointed Administrator of St. John's. On the death of the Very Rev. Dean Flanagan, P.P., V.G., in 1904, he was appointed pastor of Adare, and a few years ago he was given a place in the Cathedral Chapter. Canon Griffin was very popular in the diocese, and especially in Adare, and was a personal friend of the late Earl of Dunraven.

After solemn Office and Requiem High Mass the interment took place to-day in the Adare Parish Church. The Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. Keane, presided at the solemn ceremonies. Rev. Fr. Connolly, P.P., Parteen, was celebrant; deacon, Rev. Fr. O'Connor, P.P., St. Mary's; sub-deacon, Rev. Fr. H. O'Connor, C.C., do.; master of ceremonies, Rev. Fr. McNamara, Adm., St. John's.

There were upwards of sixty clergy in the choir.
