BANK OF IRELAND.

We publish in page 2 the report and balance sheet of the Bank of Ireland for the year ended 31st December last, to be presented to the General Court of Proprietors on Tuesday, 18th instant. It is shown that after meeting all charges and providing for bad and doubtful debts, interest due on deposits and rebates on bills not at maturity, the nett profits amount to £542,288, to which must be added a sum of £70,650 brought forward from December, 1925, making a total of £612,945. Out of this total the proprietors at a general court held at the Bank of Ireland on 16th July, 1926, declared an interim dividend of 8½ per cent., less tax. The governors and directors having transferred £150,000 to the rest now recommend that a final dividend of 9 per cent., less tax, be declared for the year ended 31st December, making together with the dividend paid on August 1, 1926, a distribution of 17½ per cent., less tax, for the year, carrying forward £68,099. Deposits amount to £30,099,954, or about two million pounds less than at the end of 1925. It is worthy of note that with the amount now being placed to "rest" or reserve the total in that account is actually £150,000 more than the total paid up capital of the bank.

CITY ELECTRICITY SUPPLY.

At the meeting of the Corporation Electric Lighting Committee last night, the revised draft agreement with Messrs Siemens Schuckert for a temporary supplementary supply of current from the Shannon Power Works was submitted by the Borough Electrical Engineer. The Committee approved the agreement subject to ratification by the Ministry of Industry and Commerce. When this is confirmed the question of way leave will be taken up, and already notices have been served with this object on the owners of lands through which it will be necessary to erect standards to carry the cables.

Lenihan sustained a fracture of the left leg, but Trotter was more seriously injured, receiving internal injuries. They were conveyed in the Corporation Fire Station ambulance to the City Hospital.
