

**Limerick Circuit Court.**

**Workmen's Compensation Claims.**

McElligott, K.C., resumed the Limerick Circuit Court to-day hearing of applications under the Compensation Acts.

Murphy, Carey's-road, claimed compensation for the loss of her son who was killed at the Limerick while employed by Messrs. Siemens on the 10th November last.

She stated that the amount had been considered by the court with the answer admitting the claim. Mr L. O'B. Kelly (instructed by O'B. Kelly, solicitor), who appeared for the applicant, stated that he did not see the answer, and knew nothing about the case this morning.

Dodds, solr, for the defendants, advised the court, and his lordship directed that the amount be paid out to the widow. He also directed that £100 be invested for the benefit of the children.

An application was made by Mr W. H. O'Donnell (instructed by Mr P. E. O'Donnell, solicitor) on behalf of John Dowling, Newcastle, for a review of an award of 5s. weekly to James O'Sullivan, who was injured by a fall from a horse.

After hearing the medical evidence, the court refused the application.

P. Layan, solr., represented the

case of John Moynihan v. the Great Southern Railways Company, Mr J. S. O'Donnell, solr., applied on behalf of the plaintiff for an arbitration order and the court issued a memorandum.

The applicant's case was that he lived in Carey's-road, City, and was employed by the defendant company as a labourer.

On the 17th May last, while at work, he was struck by an iron bar weighing three stone, with the result that his hearing was affected for some time, and he suffered from general debility. He was under medical treatment and was totally incapacitated from the time of the injury until the 23rd October, when he was partially incapacitated since the latter date. His wages were £2 6s 8d a week, and he received 35s a week up to October, when he was dismissed.

Roberts, in reply to the court, stated that the applicant had not done any clerical work or time-keeping, and that he was employed in a suitable employment for applicant, and that he was carrying a hip-riding brass.

**FATAL QUARREL NEAR DROMCOLLOGHER.**

A row which had a fatal result occurred at half-past ten in a cottage near Dromcollogher last night. It appears that the occupier of the cottage, a man named Wm. Horan, had a controversy with a lodger named Patrick Cregan. In the scuffle that ensued Cregan is alleged to have been struck by Horan with his fist underneath the heart. He fell to the ground and expired in a short time. Later Horan was arrested and charged with causing the death of Cregan, who was a married man, and the driver of the motor bus between Charleville and Dromcollogher. It is stated that deceased was a native of Askeaton, and that his wife is a school teacher in Lismore.

**THE DOMINICAN SEPT-CENTENARY.**

A committee of influential citizens has been formed to commemorate the Sept-Centenary of the coming to Limerick of the Dominican Order, and to raise funds for the renovation of their church in Glentworth street.

The first public function in connection with the celebration takes the form of a Whist Drive, which will be held in St. Michael's Hall on Friday night next, the 11th inst. Already several generous friends of the Dominican Fathers have come forward with handsome gifts as prizes, and it only now remains for the general public to attend in large numbers to ensure that this initial effort will be a great success.

**COUNTY HEALTH BOARD ESTIMATE.**

The estimate and demand of the County Limerick Board of Health for the year ending 31st March, 1928, amounts to £44,942, which is a reduction in the amount for the current year. It represents a rate approximately of one and tenpence half-penny in the pound, compared with two and twopence this year. The Secretary's estimate for all services—County Hospital, County Home, transferred services and separate charges—was £49,827, which was reduced by £4,885.
