**DEATH OF VEN. ARCHDEACON  
O'SHEA, P.P., V.F.**

We regret to record the death of the Ven.  
Archdeacon James O'Shea, P.P., V.F., which  
took place on Thursday at the Parochial  
House, Kilmallock, after a short illness. One  
of the oldest clergymen in the Diocese—he  
was about 80 years of age—the Archdeacon  
was held in the highest esteem by his brother  
clergy, and by all classes and creeds. By  
his parishioners he was beloved for his kindly  
and genial manner, and for his keen interest  
in the church at Kilmallock, which he was  
instrumental in beautifying and structurally  
improving, thus carrying on the work of his  
predecessors in this respect.

The late Archdeacon, who was born at  
Kildimo, studied at the Seminary, Limerick  
and afterwards at Maynooth, where he was  
ordained about 1870. He was curate to  
his uncle, Rev. Dr. O'Shea, P.P., Rathkeale,  
and was also curate at Cappagh, whence he  
was translated to St. John's, Limerick; and  
afterwards to St. Michael's, where he had as  
fellow-curates the two late Bishops, Most  
Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer and Most Rev. Dr.  
Hallinan. He was appointed Administrator  
of St. Michael's, and subsequently became  
parish priest of Croom, from which he was  
transferred to Kilmallock 22 years ago last  
May, as P.P. and V.F. When the Chapter  
was established in the diocese he was one of  
the first to be appointed Canon. He be-  
came Archdeacon about 7 years ago.

The obsequies took place at Kilmallock  
to-day.
