

General's Report for week ended 26th February. The births are represented by 272 in the Dublin Registration Area; Cork, 219; Limerick, 236; Waterford, 157. Infectious diseases represent but seven cases in the County Borough of Limerick in the period February 5-26—viz., enteric fever, 1; scarlet fever, 4; and diphtheria, 2. The deaths from all causes appertaining to the undermentioned areas for last week and for the past four weeks, respectively, were equal to the following annual rates per 1,000 of the population:—Eleven Town Districts, 29.5 and 24.6; Dublin Registration Area, 33.1 and 27.1; Dublin County Borough, 34.3 and 28.2; Cork, 24.6 and 20.4; Limerick, 15.8 and 18.4; and Waterford, 23.5 and 17.1. The deaths from the principal epidemic diseases, recorded for the Eleven Town Districts during last week were equal to an annual rate of 2.0 per 1,000. Of the 37 deaths from all causes for Cork, one was due to diarrhoea and enteritis of a child under two years, and two were from influenza; included in the 12 deaths for Waterford is one from influenza; and one of the 13 deaths for Wexford, and two of the 9 deaths for Kilkenny were also from influenza.

DEATH OF MR T. W. BROWNING.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Thomas Wise Browning, which took place at his residence, Carass Court, Croom, on Sunday night, in the 79th year of his age. Mr Browning had been in failing health for some months past, and his demise was not unexpected. A member of a leading county family, he was very highly respected and esteemed by all classes and creeds, who sympathise sincerely with his family in the bereavement. The late Mr. Browning was an old member of the County Grand Jury, and a magistrate for some forty years. Otherwise he lived the life of a country gentleman, and did not take part in public affairs. He was a prominent churchman, one of the oldest members of the Diocesan Council, was Diocesan Treasurer, and a Diocesan Trustee, and a regular attendant at the meetings of the Synod.
