THE ELECTRICITY SUPPLY BILL.

Shannon Scheme.

The electricity (supply) Bill, the text of which was issued yesterday proposes to make provision for the reorganisation and regulation of the generation, transmission, distribution, and supply of electricity throughout the Saorstát, and, in particular, to make provision for the generation of electricity in the works constructed by the State under the Shannon Electricity Act, 1925, and for the transmission, distribution, and supply of such electricity, and, for that purpose, to make provision for the management, administration, and control of the works with a view to the efficient and economic operation thereof, and to amend the Shannon Electricity Act, 1925.

DEATH OF CANON RYAN, P.P.

We regret to announce the death of the Very Rev. Canon Ryan, P.P., Ballingarry, Co. Limerick, which occurred yesterday after a brief illness, at the age of 79 years. He was appointed pastor of the parish 25 years ago, and was very highly esteemed by the community.
