ciplinary tribunal. I have no control over the disciplinary side of your force.

Sergeant O'Neill said he merely wanted to put the facts before the Justice. The car was manufactured in Cork in 1924.

The District Justice said the sorgeant, being a peace officer, should be a shining light of all the civic virtues, and he had a motor car that was not taxed. What would other people who were prosecuted for not paying their taxes say to that? The fact that the car was manufactured in Cork in 1924 would alter the maximum penalty to £30, and he would mitigate it to £10.

There is no question that at some time after the receipt of the Italian reply to the original American memorandum the Italian Ambassador in Washington informally conveyed to the State Department the suggestion that some, at least, of the Italian objections were not impossible of modification, and a certain, perhaps exaggerated, importance is attached to semi-official hints from Paris of a change of attitude there. This is all, however, unless the United States Ambassadors in Paris and Rome have informed their Government of developments which have not been observed by or related to the Press.

### MOUNTAINOUS SEAS.

The seas observed by mariners in the North Atlantic during the past winter storms established records for the amount of damage done to shipping that will be long remembered. An idea of the size of those mountains of water may be gauged from the recorded height of some of these seas on the South-West Trish coast. During a storm on January 28th, the keepers on the Bull Rock Lighthouse observed six consecutive seas completely submerging the Cow Rock. This rock is 205 feet high. At the same time every sea was going over the portion of the broken tower on the Calf Rock Lighthouse.
