He immediately, he said, phoned to Mr Enright, who was waiting for the call from him, as he was aware of what he was going to do. The arrangement was to divide the winnings, fifty fifty, but the pot boiled over and they got no money. Clarke added he did not know how Enright was to get the telegram ante-coded, but suspected he had some friend in the Post Office who would do the trick—that there was a chance of bringing it off.

Mr Power—Had these wires been accepted as bona fide, what would have been the benefit to the accused?

Captain Moynihan—From the enquiries I have made, I have ascertained they would have received £474.

Mr Power—That concludes the evidence.

Mr Leahy reserved his defence.

Mr Power applied that the accused be returned for trial, but he would not, he said, oppose bail.

The accused were returned for trial to the next Circuit Court for the city—Enright in £400 and two sureties of £200 each, and Clarke in £200 and two sureties of £100 each.

### LADY DUNBOYNE'S WILL.

Caroline Maude Blanche, Dowager Baroness Dunboyne, of Swinley House, Ascot, Berks, widow of the sixteenth Baron Dunboyne, died on November 1st, leaving unsettled property of the value of £8,054 4s 3d, with net personalty £5,304 4s 9d. Probate is granted to her sons—Lord Dunboyne, of Knoppogue Castle, Quin, Ireland; Colonel Lesley James Probyn Butler, of Calverley Cottage, Tiverton, Devon; and Captain Robert Thomas Rowley Probyn Butler, of Nanose Wool, Dorset. Under the provisions of her marriage settlement, she appoints £3,000 to her daughter, Blanche Amy Charlotte Butler; £2,000 to her son Robert Thomas Rowley, £4,000 to her son Theobald Patrick, and the remainder of the funds to her son Lord Dunboyne; and under another settlement she appoints £1,000 each to her sons Robert Thomas Rowley and Theobald Patrick; £2,000 to her daughter, Blanche Amy; and the residue of the funds to her son Lord Dunboyne. All other her property she leaves to her son Lord Dunboyne.

## MURDER CHARGE AT TIPPERARY.

### Farm Hand Sent for Trial.

District Justice Troy sat specially in Tipperary Courthouse to investigate a charge preferred against Thomas Nash, a native of County Limerick, who is alleged to have caused injuries to William Davern, which resulted in his death at Kingswell, Tipperary, on April 5th last. Both had been fellow-farm workers.

Mr F. J. O'Connor, State Solicitor, prosecuted, and Mr J. F. Darcy, solicitor, appeared for the accused.

The State Solicitor said that the men had had an altercation in their master's farmyard and subsequently Nash entered the shed where the deceased was. High words were heard, there was the sound of a thud, and Davern was found suffering from terrible injuries to the head, from which he later died in hospital. Nash disappeared, and when arrested and charged with murder, made a statement, admitting that he struck Davern and ran away, as he was frightened at the result of his action.

The prisoner was sent for trial.

## FATAL BURNING ACCIDENT AT ADARE.

Mrs Mary Jennette, a middle-aged woman, whose home address was 22 Brian Terrace, Croydon Park, Fairview, succumbed on Friday at Croom Hospital as a result of burns accidentally received at the Dunraven Arms Hotel, Adare.

Mrs Jennette had been employed as a cook at the hotel, and on Wednesday night her apron accidentally caught fire, and the flames spreading to the rest of her clothing, caused her to be very seriously injured.

In spite of every effort of the hospital staff, Mrs Jennette died on Friday, and at the inquest a verdict of death from shock was returned.

The deceased's friends had been summoned from Dublin, but found that death had occurred a few hours before their arrival.
