# MURDER CHARGE AT TIPPERARY.

### Farm Hand Sent for Trial.

District Justice Troy sat specially in Tipperary Courthouse to investigate a charge preferred against Thomas Nash, a native of County Limerick, who is alleged to have caused injuries to William Davern, which resulted in his death at Kingswell, Tipperary, on April 5th last. Both had been fellowfarm workers.

Mr F. J. O'Connor, State Solicitor, prosecuted, and Mr J. F. Darcy, solicitor, appeared for the accused.

The State Solicitor said that the men had had an altercation in their master's farmyard and subsequently Nash entered the shed where the deceased was. High words were heard, there was the sound of a thud, and Davern was found suffering from terrible injuries to the head, from which he later died in hospital. Nash disappeared, and when arrested and charged with murder, made a statement, admitting that he struck Davern and ran away, as he was frightened at the result of his action.

The prisoner was sent for trial.

# FATAL BURNING ACCIDENT AT ADARE.

Mrs Mary Jennette, a middle-aged woman, whose home address was 22 Brian Terrace, Croydon Park, Fairview, succumbed on Friday at Croom Hospital as a result of burns accidentally received at the Dunraven Arms Hotel, Adare.

Mrs Jennette had been employed as a cook at the hotel, and on Wednesday night her apron accidentally caught fire, and the flames spreading to the rest of her clothing, caused her to be very seriously injured.

In spite of every effort of the hospital staff, Mrs Jennette died on Friday, and at the inquest a verdict of death from shock was returned.

The deceased's friends and been summoned from Dublin, but found that death had occurred a few hours before their arrival.
