NUNGESSER'S FATE.

Wrecked 'Plane Seen off Kerry Coast.

Information glesned by a Tralee correspondent furnishes strong presumptive evidence that Captain Nungessor's machine sank at Castleshannon Bay, off the Kerry Coast, about nooh on 10th May:

At 10 that morning Michael Casey, Castle strainon, found a strong smell of petrol wafted over the surf. Later he noticed an unusual object floating a mile and a half from the shore. He expected it would be washed ashore, but noticed that suddenly it seemed to have got water-logged, turned over, and what appeared to be two propellors of an aeroplane became visible. Almost immediately after getting water-logged and upturning it sank and disappeared

The exact location of submerging was be tween Bird Island and Ballingarry Leap, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles off Ballyheigue coast, in 110 feet of The place is in direct line with Carrigoholt, on the Clare coast.

While Casey and others were watching the wreckage, a bottle flung by a wave on the strand smashed in pieces near them. A fragment of the label attached to a bit of the bottle showed part of a French name.

The theory locally is that Nungesser came grief probably on the Sunday night previously a hundred miles off the Irish coast. and the scroplane drifted along for over 40 hours, until it got waterlogged. It may be that Nungesser and Coli got jammed in the wreck, when it sunk, and the bodies would still be entangled in it.

COUNTY LIMERICK TRAGEDY.

Veterinary Surgeon's Death.

As briefly reported in our saturday ever ing issue a tragic accident took place near Bulgaden at 12.30 on Saturday morning, resulting in the death of Mr D. B. Colbert, V.S., Kilmallock. He was returning from Kilteely on a motor bicycle and collided with a donkey cart at Bulgaden.

The sad occurrence has cast a gloom over The said occurrence has cast a gloom over bulgaden and Kilmallock districts, where the deepest regret is felt at Mr Colbert's demise, and the utmost sympathy is ex-tended to the members of his family in their

A tiative of Athea, he had resided in Kilmallock for over twelve months, of which area he was veterinary inspector since the death of Mr M. J. Mitchell; V.S.

The Inquest.

An inquest was held by Coroner P. J. Cleary, M.D., and a jury, of which Mr M. Fitzgerald was foreman. Supt. Glennon represented the authorities.

Thomas Real, Hospital, deposed he was coming from Kilmallock, which he left about 11 o'clock (old time). He had an ass and cart with two children on it. When he had passed Bulgaden school the donkey trotting slowly, a little to the left of the centre of the road, and he did not hear or see anything until the car stopped at a turn of the road; he did not hear the noise of a motor bicycle. His daughter said a man was hurt. He jumped off the car and sav a man thrown on the road at the left-hand side of witness's car-the footpath side The bicycle was also thrown down, and he (witness) got so excited he did not know what way it was. He ran to Mr T. Con-nolly's house for assistance, and left his children on the car. Mr Connolly came in a couple of minutes. He (witness) had no light on his car; he did not see a light on the bicycle, or coming against him, neither did he see the man coming.

To the Foreman-I was sitting on the right-hand side of my car on the rider, and the children were at the back. Dec did not speak

The Guards mentioned that they a Real at Kilmallock for not having a light.

Mr Michael Colbert, Athea, brother of deceased, gave evidence of identification. Deceased was thirty years of age.

Mr T. Connolly, Bulgaden, deposed that about 12.10 a.m. he heard a motor bicycle pass slowly, and in a few minutes a man called to have him come out quickly, that a man was badly hurt or killed. He wen at once about 100 yards in Kilmallock direction. On the south side of the road he saw a donkey and car facing the east, and Di Colbert on the north side. The front whee of the motor bicycle was wedged between the body and left wheel of the car. Do Colbert was partly on his right shoulder, with his left leg across the saddle of the bicycle, the right leg under the bicycle, and the head on the ground. Life appeared to be nearly extinct, and witness, in company with the two little girls, knelt on the road and said an Act of Contrition into the dying man's ear. He then went for the Rev. Father Coleman, who attended and administered the last rights of the Church, after which they brought deceased to witness's

Mr D. O'Brien, N.T., deposed he was called about 12.30 a.m. He partly dressed and went on as quickly as possible. Dr Colbert was apparently dying. Mr Connolly and others were there, and they made every effort to restore Dr Colbert. Mr Connolly went for the priest and Father Coleman attended and administered the last rites of the Church, as stated. Mr P. O'Donnell went to Kilmallock to acquaint people there Real did his utmost to summon them at

once. Real was sober.

Sergeant Carr, Kilmalleck, deposed he was on duty at one o'clock that morning, when the occurrence was reported to him He motored to Bulgaden and found the body still warm. He found a small cut at the back of the right ear; it was bleeding slightly. The neck appeared to be broken. There was a little blood on the road, 18 inches from the kerb stone, and some petrol was also on the road.

Dr John Meade, Bruff, deposed that he examined deceased. There was a small wound at the back of the right ear, but no fracture communicating with it. Death was due to the dislocation of one of the cervical

all knew deceased, a very quiet, good-living man. It was an awfully sad case, but unfortunately, those accidents will As far as he could see, there was no blame to be attached to anybody. They had no one to prove whether there was light in the lamp or not, as it was broken, but Real said he saw no light. Mr Connolly said an Act of Contrition into Dr Colbert's ear, and Father Coleman administered the last rites of the Church. He suggested a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony, and that it was the result of an accident in a collision between the motor cycle and donkey

The jury found accordingly, and expressed sympathy with the relatives of deceased, in which the Coroner and Superintendent Glennon joined.

Mr M. Colbert suitably acknowledged the vote, and thanked Father Coleman for his prompt assistance, also Mr Connolly and others for their kindness to his brother.

REMOVAL OF REMAINS.

The remains were subsequently removed to SS. Peter and Paul's Church, Kilmallock. Those present included Messrs Michael. William, and James Colbert (brothers of deeased), Mr James Colbert, T.D (cousin) Mr T. Crowley, Ballylanders, and several residents of Bulgaden and Kilmallock.

The Following Rules Should by
Carefully Observed:

1. Whenever possible have the eggs carefully
earried from the Distribution Station, as when sent
by cart, rail or post their germination power is
often destroyed or impaired.

2. Allow eggs to rest for twenty-four hours,
after being removed from Distribution Station,
prior to setting.

3. Set the hen at night in a well ventilated semidark place, apart from the other fowl.

4. Use a nest box without a bottom; make the
nest upon the ground, soon out the earth sancer
shape, and line the hollow thus formed with out
strew.

5. Before setting inspect the hen for insects, and if infected dust her thoroughly with insect powder. A hen covered with vermin sets badly, and in due course the chickens become also infested; they do not thrive, and the result is often fatal.

6. Make certain that the hen comes off her nest daily to feed, and that she is provided with hard corn, fresh water, grit, and a dry dust bath-Daily cooling the eggs is most necessary and important.

Portant.

7. Test the eggs on the seventh and fourteenth days, when infertile or addled eggs containing dead germs may be removed. Test at night by holding the eggs up to a strong light, and as a candle flame, when its contents may be seen. An infertile egg will appear quite clear, like a new laid one. In a fertile, egg on the seventh day a dark spot will be noticed floating towards the broad end of the egg.

I. The suppliers undertake to supply eggs of the breeds recommended to any person residing in the county, and applications for sittings should be made direct to them.

II. Sittings will be supplied in the order in which the applications are received, and where the demand is considerable each applicant may be restricted to one sitting at a time.

III. The eggs will be carefully packed, but the applicant shall be required to bear cost of package and carriage on eggs forwarded by rail or post.

IV. All eggs supplied will be stamped, and infertile (clear) eggs will be replaced, provided they are returned to the supplier, bearing the original stamp (carriage paid and cost of return transmitted), within one month of the date on which they are supplied.

V. Each applicant shall be restricted to a tota of TEN SITTINGS under the County Scheme from any Station or Stations, the several members of each household to be regarded as one applicant for the purpose of these Regulations.

N.B.—Applications must be made direct to the Station Holders, price of eggs to accompany same, together with cost of backage and carriage.
