was born in india on zith July, 1000, being eldest son of Mr W. F Bernard, a Civil Engineer of Irish extraction. He was educated at a private school, and proceeded to Trinity College, Dublin, in 1879, where he gained a scholarship. The following year he was Senior Moderator in Mathematics and Philosophy, and won successive prizes and distinctions, and obtained the M.A. degree in 1863. He was appointed Fellow and Tuter of Trinity in 1884, and was ordained in 1886. He acted as Chaplain to the Lord Lieutenant from 1886 to 1902, was Archbishop King's Lecturer in Divinity, 1888-1911; was Treasurer of St. Patrick's Cathedral, 1897-1902, becoming Dean in the latter year. He was elected Bishop of Ossory, Ferns and Leighlin in 1911. In 1915 he was appointed Archbishop of Dublin. He resigned the latter dignity in 1919 to become Provost of Trinity Collegé.

Dr Bernard took an active interest in public life and work. He was President of the Royal Irish Academy from 1916 to 1921, a Commissioner of National Education for some years, and, later, a Commissioner of Intermediate Education. He acted on the Irish Convention of 1917, and was appointed a Privy Councillor. Distinctions and honorary degrees were conferred on him by various universities and colleges. A man of broad sympathies, Dr Bernard was a prolific writer, though few of his works appeal to the general reader.

CITY DROWNING FATALITY.

A young fellow named J. Flanagan, 4 Fitzgerald's Cottages, Prospect, was drowned in a quarry hole at Rosbrien this evening. The deceased, who was eighteen years of age, went with another boy to bathe in the quarry hole, which is about twenty feet deep. They had not been long in the water when Flanagan showed signs of distress, as he was, it is stated, a rather indifferent swimmer. Despite the efforts of his companions he sank, and never rose to the surface.
