They were only a short listance from the opposite side when Tanagan showed signs of distress, and houted to witness, who told him he had not ar to go, being only a few yards of the ank. When witness got alongside deceased ank, and witness caught him by the hair of He was unable to retain his iold, and when deceased came to the surface vitness again endeavoured to bring him shore, using all his energies to do so, but vithout success. Deceased then disappeared ind never rose to the surface again. iess was by this time quite exhausted, and naving made the bank he again dived, but ailed to get the body. There was no ailed to get the body esistance forthcoming, and he subsequently apprised the Civic Guard at Edward street.

Sergeant Ruane stated that the body was recovered a couple of hours after the

Dr. W. P. Dundon, house surgeon, attriouted death to asphyxia due to drowning, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly, commending the heroic conduct of Houlihan, and expressing the view that the quarry role should be protected with the object of preventing bathing in it.

The caretaker replied that he had done everything possible in this respect.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL SWORN INQUIRY.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

DEAR SIR, Very recently my attention as been brought to a report communicated to the Press of a meeting of the Limerick County Council in committee, which was neld privately on July 30th last.

As a ratepayer I protest against the ection of the Council in not admitting the public and the Press to this important neeting. The cost of the sworn inquiry was very great indeed-it must have far exseeded the costs in the case of Hewson v. Limerick Co. Council-and after all this expenditure it is deplorable that the report should be disposed of in such a summary At least those who, tendered evidence entirely in public interest should nave been notified of the Council's intention to hold such a meeting.

Concerning my own evidence, I went to hat inquiry with certain concrete suggesions on the matter of road repairing perations which, if put into practice, should oring about greater efficiency and smoothiess in the working of direct labour system through the adoption of methods which would secure reward for merit and eliminate resent obvious faults.

The Inquest.

The enquiry into the circumstances attending the death of Eric Sparling, draper's assistant, aged 17 years, who succumbed in Barrington's Hospital on the 27th ultimo to injuries received in a motor cycle collision at Croagh, Rathkeale, on the 22nd of that month, was resumed last evening by the City Coroner, Mr J. S. McNeice, and a jury.

At the previous sitting of the jury, evidence of identification was given, and a month's adjournment was necessitated owing to the principal witness being in the County

Hospital, Croom.

Denis O'Connor, farmer, Croagh, Rathheale, stated on the 22nd July William Fitzgibbon came to his house and stated that he had, while motor cycling that morning, being in collision with the deceased. Fitzgibbon was bleeding from the head, and having attended to him, and sent for Dr Magner, witness went to Croagh Cross, where he saw deceased on the roadside. He was then told that Eric Sparling had been injured, and saw him standing against a wall, the two motor bicycles being on the road. Later Fitzgibbon was attended by the doctor, and removed to Rathkeale, where he lived.

William Sheedy, also a farmer, of Croagh, deposed to arriving on the scene after the accident and seeing the deceased standing against a wall. Both bicycles were on the road, and deceased was bleeding, but did not reply when questioned about the occurrence. His mother was sent for and had him taken to his home at Anagan Castle, Croagh.

In his evidence, William Fitzgibbon stated he left home at 8 o'clock on the morning of the 22nd July on a motor bicycle to transact business in Charleville. He was travelling at 15 miles an hour, and approaching the bend near Croagh he saw Eric Sparling coming towards him on the right side of the road. He was then, it seemed to witness, travelling at a little too much speed. Witness, who was up to this keeping to the centre of the road, took his own side, put on the clutch and slowed down. He was then only a few yards from deceased, who banged into him. Both were thrown off, and having got up, witness went to O'Connor's house, where he told of the He was bleeding, and so was accident deceased.

Dr. W. P. Dundon stated deceased was admitted to Barrington's Hospital on the 25th ultimo suffering from a lacerated wound of the right side of the forehead, contusions of the face and head, and fracture of the base of the skull. He died on the 27th, two days later, death being due to fracture of the base of the skull.

The Coroner said that was the whole evidence in a very sad tragedy.

The jury found that death was due to fracture of the skull accidentally sustained.
