GAS WORKER'S SUDDEN DEATH.

Yesterday morning John Quinlivan, aged
sixty years, was taken suddenly ill while at
work at the Gas Concern, and died in a
short time. The deceased was foreman at
the works, and lived in Taylor's Row, Cecil
street, whither the body was removed in the
Fire Station ambulance.

The Inquest.

An inquest was held at 20 Catherine street
last evening by Mr J. S. McNeice
and a jury into the circumstances connected
with death.

Mary Kearsley, Griffith's Row, deposed to
being a daughter of the deceased, who was
aged about 60 years. He was employed as
forman at the Gas Works. He left home
that morning at 7.30 o'clock to go to his
work, and she did not see him alive after
that time. Deceased often complained of
rheumatism and pains in his feet, but he was
in excellent health for the past two months.

Michael Danford, Old Dominick street,
stated he was employed at the Gas Works,
and knew the deceased for the past 30 years.
Whilst speaking to the deceased he noticed
him getting suddenly ill, and witness caught
him. Deceased died about ten minutes
later.

Patrick McInerney, Vizes Field, gave
evidence as to assisting in the removal of
deceased to the ambulance.

Doctor J. Roberts stated that he examined
the body and found no marks of violence.
He attended deceased previous to his death
for lumbago and bronchial trouble. He was
of opinion that deceased died from heart
failure.

The jury returned a verdict to the effect
that deceased died from heart failure.

LEEDS UNIVERSITY.

Donor of £100,000 Gift.

The "Yorkshire Evening News" says that
the offer last week of £100,000 to defray
the cost of the library buildings in connec-
tion with the cost of the Leeds University
building scheme, with the request that the

POTEEN MAKING.

Arrests at Dunmanway.

Mrs John Barry, a cottager, of Goulacullin,
some six or seven miles from Dunmanway,
and a man named Daniel O'Leary, of Glouna-
keary, were arrested by the Dunmanway
Civic Guards early on Sunday morning last
and brought by Guards O'Donoghue and
Byrne to the local barrack, charged with
being found engaged in the manufacture of
illicit spirits or poteen, at Goulacullin.

The accused were arrested, and all the
materials brought in on a lorry to Dun-
manway Barracks. They were brought up
at a special court at Bandon, before Mr
Crotty, D.J., yesterday, the female prisoner
being remanded on substantial bails to Dun-
manway District Court on 14th inst. The
other defendant, Daniel O'Leary, would not
accept bails.

MOTORIST'S INEXCUSABLE CONDUCT

At Dromcollogher District Sessions yester-
day, Mr Charles Kenny, District Justice,
imposed a fine of 40s. on Thomas Kelly,
Newmarket, for driving a motor car in a
reckless manner, and at a speed dangerous
to the public. The complainant, Sergeant
Cuniffe, said Kelly drove the car up and
down the Square at a furious rate, and was
apparently under the influence of drink on
the occasion.

The defendant said the car was not run-
ning properly and he was testing it.
The Justice said such conduct was in-
excusable, and he had a good mind to endorse
defendant's licence.

LAUSANNE CONFERENCE.
