## BRITISH EX-SERVICE MEN

## And Home Assistance.

At the meeting of the City Health Board last month comment was made on the report of Colonel Crosfield, chairman of the British Legion, in which it was stated to be alleged that British ex-Service men were victims in Limerick as regards home assistance. The Secretary was directed to write to Colonel Crcs ield for particulars.

The following letter was read from the Colonel at the meeting of the Mealth Board on Thursday evening last :- "Dear Sir,-I am in receipt of your letter of August 19th, which has only just reached me, as I have been away on holidays. I have never accused the Limerick authorities of any unofficial victimisation, and it is evident that you have only seen a travesty of my report. When in Limerick I asked the British Legion officials whether there was any unofficial victimisation in that locality, and they answered me that this was not the case. I quite believe that the Limerick Borough Board of Health is dealing with distress without discrimination and under very difficult cir-

## TENDER FOR CONCRETING SANCTIONED.

The Ministry for Local Government has sanctioned the acceptance of Mr. P. Mullov's tender for the concreting of certain streets in the city, pointing out, however, that the limit of expenditure was £11,700 the amount available from the road grant. If the Corporation were prepared to meet the difference in the contract figure of £16,100 they should submit a new schedule of streets to be done to the Ministry for sanction. It is to be hoped that the Council will borrow the difference and carry out the work of concreting in its entirety.

## BOILER EXPLOSION IN TRALEE.

The boiler of the tar-spraying machine of the Kerry County Council took fire in the Square, Tralce, while the road men were at dinner. There was a loud explosion, which created considerable alarm, and people rushed from all parts of the town to ascertain the cause. A meeting of the Cumann na nGaedheal Party was in progress at the time, and numbers of the audience joined in the rush for the Square. The lid of the boiler was blown off by the force of the explosion. The burning tar burst up in volumes of flame and smoke, which lasted for over an hour.

# FARMER'S TRAGIC END.

An inquest was held at Ballyvoureen, Murroe, last night by Dr M. R. Clery, Coroner, into the circumstances under which Thomas Walshe, a farmer, aged seventy-five years, met his death, and whose body was found the previous day in a stream running contiguous to his house.

The medical evidence showed that death was due to asphyxia, but as there was nothing to determine how deceased got into the water a verdict of found drowned was returned.
