unable to do so. Plaintiff then used dirty language. Defendant told him to go away as there were ladies in the yard. Plaintiff then demanded overtime wages, and defendant told him that if he called to him next morning he would pay him, as he considered he had enough drink taken at the time. Subsequently plaintiff took off his coat, and struck defendant on the chest. Defendant then closed on plaintiff and both fell. It took defendant a quarter of an hour to get plaintiff out of the yard. Later plaintiff came to the kitchen and said if he was sober defendant would not put him out of the yard.

In cross-examination, defendant said the plaintiff, drunk or sober, was a reliable sewerage man, as he was his lifetime at that work. He did not want to be offensive to the plaintiff, but he was using bad language.

James O'Brien stated that he was also employed by defendant. On the day of the occurrence he had drink taken with plaintiff, but he would not say plaintiff was drunk. He heard plaintiff use bad language, and saw him in a fighting attitude and take off his coat.

His Lordship said in his opinion he thought that a certain amount of force was required in getting the plaintiff out of the yard when he took off his coat. He would dismiss the case with costs, and expressed the opinion that it was hard that the defendant should be brought into Court. He considered it was a case for the District Court and not for the Circuit Court.

**TRAINING OF A HORSE.**

Ed. Houlihan sued Gerald Barry, Limerick, in respect of the training of a horse.

Mr T. O'B Kelly, solr., appeared for plaintiff, and Mr T. O'Donnell, B.L. (instructed by Mr P. J. O'Sullivan, solr.), for defendant.

Plaintiff's case was that he took out a trainer's licence this year. He resided near Clarina. A horse named Golden Lomond was brought to the stable of Mr King at Mungret, and he was asked to train this animal. He exercised the horse for about six months, and in June last the horse won a race at Thurles. His claim for training was at the rate of 30s a week.

The defendant stated that the horse was sent to Mr King. He never asked plaintiff to do anything with the horse, nor did he speak to him regarding the training of the animal. There was no arrangement between the plaintiff and himself.

In reply to Mr Kelly, defendant stated that Mr King, who was a personal friend of his, agreed to train the horse at £1 a week.

His Lordship—Is not that a ridiculous price to charge for the training of a horse?

Defendant—It is a friendly agreement. The horse is trained by Mr King and his man.

was hurt. At first he said that he was not, but later he found that his right shoulder and back were injured, and he suffered from nervousness since the occurrence. In cross-examination, plaintiff stated that the lorry did not stop until it struck the pony.

Martin Woods stated he was the driver of the lorry on the occasion, and when nearing the pony at Elmswood quarry he stopped the lorry, as the animal became restive. The pony was then about 25 yards away from the lorry, and backed into it.

James O'Brien, fireman, corroborated the evidence of last witness, and added that the pony was not knocked, but when the animal struck the lorry after backing, the plaintiff was thrown off.

A decree for fifteen guineas was granted.
