FATALITY AT SHANNON SCHEME WORKS.

A very sad fatality occurred yesterday
morning on the Shannon Power Scheme at
Parteen.

It appears that James Courtney, a
labourer, aged 35, with a number of other
workmen, was engaged in excavating opera-
tions at the site of the tail race, when an
embankment gave way, and Courtney was
buried by the stones and earth before he
could get clear with his fellow-workers.
When taken out he was dead, and was
removed to a building close by. The
deceased lived in Old Francis-street, in the
city, with his wife and children, and was
a native of Killaloe.

The Inquest and Verdict.

An inquest was held to-day by Mr P.
Culloo, Coroner East Clare, and a jury.

Superintendent Mooney, Killaloe, con-
ducted the enquiry; Mr J. S. Gaffney,
solicitor, appeared for the next-of-kin, and
Mr J. Dodds, solicitor, for Messrs Siemens-
Bauunion.

The jury found "that deceased died from
shock caused by injuries received whilst
employed by Messrs Siemens-Bauunion. In
our opinion there was very grave negligence
on the part of the contractors in not seeing
that proper precautions were taken in
securing the loose rocks on the ledge under
which deceased worked."
