DEATH OF REV. W. E. BENTLEY.

We regret to record the death of the Rev. William Evans Bentley, M.A., Rector of Brosna and Abbeyfeale, which took place on Wednesday after a protracted illness. Deceased, who was in his 70th year, was many years ago a curate in St. Mary's Cathedral, Limerick, and was very popular. He was instituted Incumbent of Abbeyfeale in 1901, and during his long connection with the parish was respected and esteemed by everyone, irrespective of class or creed. He was a man of a very kindly and charitable disposition, and the poor lose in him a steadfast friend. The funeral took place at Brosna to-day (Saturday).
