Shannon Scheme and Electrical Baking.

For domestic purposes alone the possibilities of the Shannon Power Scheme are many and varied, and this fact is pointed out in propaganda work which is being carried on in Dublin. The price of bread comes home to every adult member of the community, and we see that the important question is now asked—Will the completion of the scheme cheapen the cost of the staff of life? We see that the Engineering Correspondent of the "Daily Telegraph" declares that electrical ovens are likely to reduce the cost of baking. Although men have baked bread since the beginning of history, there has been little change in the general structure of the oven. Baking to-day is virtually what it was in ancient times—save in four countries. The electric oven has revolutionised the baker's trade in parts of Switzerland, France, Canada, and the United States. Uniformity of temperature is a vital part of the production of palatable bread. Now the electrical engineer has an exact control over power that is unknown to the most skilful manipulator of furnaces. It is obvious, therefore, that electric cooking appliances, rapidly increasing in number, are certain to lead to electric baking ovens. Already a beginning has been made. Switzerland, with its abundant water power, has cheap and plentiful electricity, and it is the pioneer country in electrical baking.
