

In the 31st December, 1927, the investments stood at £29,507 6s 8d, and the assurer's account showed a credit balance £3,786 1s 10d.

It was noteworthy, the report concluded, that approximately £25,000 stood in investment on the 1st January, 1925, and that accounts were presented for audit in a highly satisfactory manner.

The Mayor—Has any member anything to say about the Auditor's report?

Mr Gough—It is a very satisfactory statement. We are making money, and it is good for the port and city.

Mr Cleeve considered that an expression of opinion should go forth from the Commissioners on the excellence of the report. The Secretary had fulfilled his duties very satisfactorily, and great credit was due to him in having received such a report from his auditor. An auditor was a man that would not give a flourishing report without facts fully warranting it.

The Mayor—Quite so. The report is very satisfactory, and shows an all round increase in revenue from almost every source.

The Secretary—Besides that investment of £25,000 there was capital expenditure in 1924 amounting to £6,834. The actual surplus was £40,156, averaging almost £1,000 a year.

Mr Cleeve said they were all aware that the port was in a flourishing condition, but thought an expression of opinion should go forth from the Board relative to the manner in which the Secretary had discharged his duties.

The Mayor—The Board are very well satisfied of the ability of the Secretary to carry out his duties.

Mr Roche agreed with the observations of Mr Cleeve. The Secretary deserved the very best thanks of the Board for the manner in which he had presented the accounts for audit.

The Mayor—I only know that Mr McGuigan is one of the most painstaking and critical auditors that I have known. There is sufficient warranty for the Secretary's ability, and I am delighted to see that the port is progressing. I hope that state of things will continue, and any little criticism of the past few months may have done us no harm.

The Secretary expressed his thanks to Mr Cleeve, Mr Roche, the Mayor, and other Commissioners for their generous expression of opinion. The Board could also take credit for the satisfactory report submitted by the auditor.
